

# BACKGROUND

The Hon'ble Prime Minister had mandated the Department of Administrative Reforms & Public Grievances (DARPG) to hold virtual conferences/webinars with District Collectors and other officers. A specific theme/sector may be taken up in each month, which past award winners since the inception of the scheme under that sector are invited to present their experiences.

In his address on Civil Services Day, 2022, the Hon'ble Prime Minister suggested that training institutes should conduct virtual sessions of one to one and half hours with the award winners as the Lead Speakers, to disseminate the best practices.

Accordingly, DARPG conducts National Good Governance Webinars, one webinar a month on different themes, on the last Friday of every month, over the year 2022 - 2024, to highlight and disseminate the best practices and sharing of experiences of the award-winning institution to facilitate replication by other States/Districts.

These Webinars covered the PM award winning initiatives on the themes 'Improving Public Service Delivery'; 'Health'; 'Aspirational District Programme'; 'Public Grievance Redressal'; 'Environment', 'Public Participation (Jan Bhagidari) through Swachh Bharat Mission'; 'Innovations at District and State levels'; 'Jal/Water Management'; 'Namami Gange'; 'Samagra Shiksha'; and 'Holistic Development of Districts'.

These webinars were attended by about 1000 officials from Ministries/Departments, State Governments and District Collectors. Given the encouraging response, it was decided to continue the initiative of organizing the National Good Governance Webinar Series in the year 2025 - 2026.

In the above backdrop, The Department of Administrative Reforms and Public Grievances (DARPG) continues its commitment towards improving governance by celebrating exemplary practices adopted by Blocks under the Prime Minister's Awards for Excellence in Public Administration. In this context, the 31<sup>st</sup> National Good Governance webinar on the theme "Aspirational Blocks Programme" was organized on 26<sup>th</sup> September, 2025.

The webinar highlighted successful initiative from two Blocks – Gamharia, Saraikela-Kharsawan, Jharkhand and Parappa, Kasaragod, Kerala; which have emerged as models in innovative governance.

# WELCOME ADDRESS

The session was chaired by **Shri Puneet Yadav**, Additional Secretary, Department of Administrative Reforms and Public Grievances (DARPG). In his opening remarks, he outlined the **innovative practices in governance** adopted under the *Prime Minister's Awards for Excellence in Public Administration* framework. He emphasized that the webinar was organized in pursuance of the direction given by the Hon'ble Prime Minister during **Civil Services Day 2022**, where the Prime Minister had suggested that **virtual sessions** be held to allow award winners to share their experiences.

He noted that a significant number of awardees from various districts and states have already presented their successful initiatives through this platform. He appreciated the **dedication and transformative governance efforts** of the **Blocks of Gamharia and Parappa**, which were the focal points of the session.

He also introduced the **keynote speakers** for the theme "*Aspirational Blocks Programme*": **Shri Ravi Shankar Shukla**, Commissioner, Department of Excise and Prohibition, Govt. of Jharkhand and **Shri Inbasekar K**, Deputy Commissioner, Kasaragod, Kerala. The Aspirational Blocks Programme was introduced in 2024 as one of the categories in the Prime Minister's Awards, which was recommended by NITI Aayog and accepted by the Government of India.

To set the context for the discussion, the session began with the **screening of two short films** highlighting impactful implementation of government schemes in **Gamharia and Parappa Blocks**.

Following the screenings, the keynote speakers were invited to present their experiences and insights.



# SESSION – I

## BRIEF OF GAMHARIA BLOCK INITIATIVE, SARAIKELA-KHARSAWAN, JHARKHAND

Gamharia Block, located in the Seraikela-Kharsawan district in the southern region of Jharkhand. The total geographical area of the Gamharia block is approximately 104.66 square kilometers. It comprises several panchayats and villages, with a mix of rural and semi-urban settlements. The block holds a strategic importance in terms of industrial and infrastructural growth due to its proximity to Jamshedpur.

Demonstrating outstanding performance across all five key themes— Gamharia Block has set a benchmark in grassroots governance. The block scored over 90% in four themes in qualitative assessment, reflecting its consistent focus on improving public service delivery and community well-being. Notably, it secured a flawless 100% in the Basic Infrastructure theme, underscoring its relentless drive to close infrastructure gaps, uplift living standards and foster inclusive rural development.

### IMPACT OF THE INITIATIVE

- **Health & Nutrition:** Block significantly improved health and nutrition, reducing SAM from 1.61% to 0.06% and MAM from 3.63% to 0.86%. Anganwadi centres with toilets rose to 95.16%, and drinking water access reached 95.56%. These achievements were enabled by awareness campaigns, capacity building, real-time monitoring, and effective implementation of NHM, PMSMA, and Poshan Abhiyan, supported by CSR funding and Jan Bhagidari.
- **Education:** Block has demonstrated impactful educational transformation through an inclusive, well-coordinated strategy aligned with Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan and Beti Bachao Beti Padhao. From March 2023 to December 2024, Class X pass rates (60%+) rose from 57.86% to 67.26% for boys and 59.52% to 70.67% for girls. In Class XII, boys improved from 60.75% to 63.46% and girls from 75.00% to 89.00%.
- **Agriculture & Allied Activities:** Irrigation was improved through check dams, rainwater harvesting and PMKSY, enabling year-round farming. FMD vaccination covered 79% of bovines, boosting livestock health. PM-Kisan Aadhaar seeding reached 100% and over 1,500 SHGs were formed with full Revolving Fund coverage, enhancing women's incomes.
- **Social Development:** Harmful practices like Dayan Pratha were tackled through awareness and legal action. SHG-linked households rose from 16,882 to 18,270 and Revolving Fund coverage reached 100%, boosting women's financial empowerment.

- **Basic Infrastructure:** Functional Household Tap Connections rose from 34.41% to nearly 45% under Jal Jeevan Mission. All villages achieved ODF+ status with solid and liquid waste management in place. BharatNet ensured 100% digital connectivity across gram panchayats, boosting access to e-services, education and financial inclusion.

# PROCEEDINGS

Shri Ravi Shankar Shukla began by expressing his gratitude to the senior leadership at DARPG for the opportunity to a comprehensive overview and progress report on the Aspirational Block Program implemented in Gamharia block.

The program is aimed at fostering inclusive development by specifically targeting underdeveloped pockets within otherwise developed districts. An evolution from the Aspirational Districts Programme, the ABP introduces standardized Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) for monitoring and assessment and was formally launched during the 2nd Civil Services Conference. In this context, the block serves as the focal unit for service delivery and governance reforms, supported by participatory planning forums known as Chintan Shivirs, where community mobilization and active stakeholder engagement take place.

The program strategy is anchored on holistic block development facilitated by data-driven monitoring mechanisms and regular performance reviews. A key innovation is the monthly ranking and felicitation of frontline workers to promote convergence, cooperation and healthy competition across administrative units. The initiative strongly emphasizes Jan Bhagidari (community participation) to foster local ownership and sustainability of developmental outcomes.

Gamharia block, which experienced Left-Wing Extremism until 2018, manifests several socio-economic challenges, including a significant Scheduled Tribe population constituting 32.75% and a literacy rate of 59.77% which remains low compared to national averages. Despite the presence of nearby industrial establishments, the block confronts endemic social issues such as ‘Dayan Pratha’ and alcoholism. A detailed Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (SWOT) analysis identified available infrastructure and dedicated frontline workers as strengths, while scarcity of human resources, inadequate training and underutilization of infrastructure were noted as weaknesses. Opportunities exist through government schemes, technological advancements and urban population dynamics while threats relate to financial constraints, poor infrastructure maintenance and the challenge of effecting behavioral changes in traditional communities.

Noteworthy innovations incorporated include the introduction of frontline worker scorecards, the establishment of partnerships with industries through Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiatives and an emphasis on technology integration and empowerment of Self-Help Groups (SHGs) to aid social development.

Interventions in health and nutrition have prioritized the education and well-being of girl children, pre and post pregnancy care, improved access to quality antenatal care and nutrition during the first 1,000 days of life. A convergence of schemes under the National Health Mission (NHM) and the Women and Child Development (WCD) department has been achieved along with public health outreach via Jan Bhagidari-driven events such as Arogya Melas and enhanced antenatal care services at Village Health and Nutrition Days (VHSND). Recognition programs for the best performing health workers have been introduced as part of ongoing efforts.

In the education sector, the education intervention in Gamharia block under the Aspirational Block Program focuses on several strategic initiatives aimed at improving learning outcomes and infrastructure. The key components include capacity building of teachers and resource persons, saturation with quality infrastructure in schools and conduct of live online classes in specific subjects such as English and Mathematics. Engagement with parents and community members through counseling sessions strengthens the support system for students. The program also hosts literature festivals to encourage cultural and intellectual development among students. Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) labs have been established in all secondary schools, addressing health and sanitation needs for adolescent girls. Additionally, digital classrooms have been introduced, notably at Kolabira Chaap, combining technology with learning. Vocational training programs, in collaboration with local industries, are also part of the initiative to enhance students' employability and link education with livelihood opportunities.

The impact of these education interventions has been significant. There has been a marked improvement in the capacity of teachers to deliver quality education, evidenced by saturation of quality infrastructure across schools in the block. The engagement of community and parents has fostered a more supportive environment for children's learning and retention. The introduction of digital classrooms and online teaching methods has modernized education delivery, making learning interactive and accessible. Literature festivals and vocational training have contributed to holistic student development, nurturing both academic and practical skills. These combined efforts have led to improved educational outcomes and greater participation in school activities, ultimately facilitating the social and economic upliftment of children in the region.

Agriculture and allied services interventions have concentrated on strengthening Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), enhancing irrigation infrastructure—especially surface water utilization through the Ganjia Barrage and promoting modern agricultural practices, livestock health improvements and groundwater conservation.

Social development initiatives include innovative activities led by SHGs such as duck chick farming, expansion of banking touchpoints and campaigns against social evils such as

‘Dayan Pratha’ and drug abuse, including active participation by renowned social activists like Padma Shree Chutni Devi.

Infrastructure development has seen significant progress with community mobilization efforts for Open Defecation Free (ODF) Plus villages, provision of functional tap water connections, live Bharat Net connectivity for digital inclusion, liquid waste management and implementation of housing schemes including the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (PMAY) in Gamharia.

The program has yielded impactful results including achieving 100% institutional delivery rates, full supplementary nutrition coverage for pregnant women and a remarkable increase in hypertension and diabetes screenings from 9.26% to 100%. Additionally, complete issuance of soil health cards was attained, enhancing agricultural productivity. The launch of the Sampoonata Abhiyan reinforced financial inclusion by providing revolving funds to 100% of SHGs, coupled with active field-level operations.

Looking ahead, the program envisages continued focus on capacity building for frontline workers, promoting responsive and accountable governance, improving both behavioral and transactional aspects of administration and deepening community empowerment. The saturation approach will guide efforts to ensure quality and comprehensive service delivery, while fostering Jan Bhagidari will remain central to securing sustainable community ownership of development initiatives.

In conclusion, the Aspirational Block Program in Gamharia stands as a model for comprehensive, data-driven and participatory governance aimed at bridging developmental disparities, enhancing service delivery and empowering grassroots communities towards sustainable and inclusive growth.



# SESSION – II

## BRIEF OF PARAPPA BLOCK INITIATIVE, KASARAGOD, KERALA

Parappa Block, situated in Kerala's northernmost Kasaragod district has been honoured with the prestigious Prime Minister's Award for Excellence in Public Administration 2024, recognizing its outstanding achievements across "Aspirational Block Programme" category.

The total geographical area of the block is approximately 40.22 square kilometers. The Block Panchayat comprises 7 Grama Panchayats: Balal, East Eleri, Kallar, Kinanoor-Karindalam, Kodom-Belur, Panathady and West Eleri.

Parappa Block's journey under the Aspirational Blocks Programme exemplifies dedication, innovation and people-centric governance. With a clear development roadmap and strong administrative will, the block has implemented impactful solutions tailored to local needs. Strategic convergence of schemes, active stakeholder involvement and consistent ground-level engagement have accelerated progress across all thematic areas. By achieving a score of 90% in qualitative aspect in all five-core themes— Parappa Block has not only demonstrated balanced and inclusive growth but also set a benchmark for other regions.

### IMPACT OF THE INITIATIVE

- Health & Nutrition: ANC registrations in the first trimester rose to 98.29% and Non-Communicable Diseases screening for the 30+ population achieved 100% coverage. SNP coverage for pregnant women increased from 26.8% to 100% and for children from 8.2% to 95.3%, aided by Poshan Tracker monitoring. All 219 Anganwadi Centres were upgraded and 5 of 9 PHCs earned NQAS accreditation.
- Education: Learning outcomes improved through remedial classes, teacher training, and career guidance across 102 schools. Over 94% schools now have girls' toilets. The Special Breakfast Scheme reduced dropouts. Free transport is provided to ST students under GODHRASARATHI.
- Agriculture & Allied activities: To tackle water scarcity, 12 Artificial Recharge Structures were built, with 14 more proposed in schools. Krishi Mahotsav, SWOT analysis and ₹5.4 crore funding from NITI Aayog and LSGDs are driving sustainable agricultural development.
- Social Development: 35,312 households were empowered through 2,198 SHGs under Kudumbashree. Social initiatives like paddy cultivation, seed distribution to 1,235 farmers and elderly care boosted livelihoods and inclusion. ₹1.16 Cr from LSGDs is

driving financial and social development.

- Basic Infrastructure: All 15 villages have achieved ODF status and all 7 Gram Panchayats are connected to Bharat Net and Live Net. PMAY housing projects, monitored by Village Extension Officers, are backed by ₹12 crore from LSGDs and integrated with the LIFE Programme. Jal Jeevan Mission targets full saturation by 2026, with current FHTC coverage at 40.5%.

Following the presentation of Shri Ravi Shankar Shukla, Commissioner, Department of Excise and Prohibition, Jharkhan the session was handed over to **Shri Inbasekar K**, Deputy Commissioner, Kasaragd. He was introduced by **Shri Puneet Yadav, Additional Secretary, DARPG.**

Shri Inbasekar began by expressing his gratitude to the senior leadership at DARPG for the opportunity to present the Aspirational Blocks Programme, Parappa which aims to accelerate the development of India's most underdeveloped blocks by targeting key sectors such as health, nutrition, education, sanitation, agriculture, infrastructure, and social inclusion. The objective is to leverage data-driven and scalable interventions that directly impact the quality of life of vulnerable sections of society.

Parappa Block has emerged as a leading model in this programme, consistently improving performance indicators and ranking second nationally in the September 2024 quarter aspirational blocks assessment. This achievement reflects the unwavering commitment of the district administration, local self-governments, frontline workers and the communities themselves.

Our work began with the intensive Chintan Shivir organized in September 2023, which served as a critical platform for diagnosing gaps, setting priorities and building consensus across stakeholders. This inclusive forum involved Panchayat leaders, government officials, departmental experts and community representatives. The outcome was the formulation of a Block Development Strategy—a comprehensive plan tailored to address Parappa's unique challenges and leverage its potentials.

To institutionalize accountability and transparency, monthly multi-stakeholder review meetings were held, involving Panchayat Presidents, government officials and sector specialists. These meetings ensured real-time monitoring of activities, resolution of bottlenecks and course correction where needed. A strong emphasis was placed on capacity building, equipping elected representatives and functionaries with the knowledge and skills to implement and monitor interventions effectively.

One of the flagship initiatives under the Aspirational Block Programme was the Sampoonata Abhiyan, an ambitious campaign held over a three-month period aimed at saturating twelve critical development indicators. This campaign mobilized both administrative machinery and community participation, resulting in significant achievements. Over 825 Non-Communicable Disease screening camps were conducted,

reaching approximately 90,000 residents aged 30 and above—a key demographic vulnerable to lifestyle diseases. Early Antenatal Care registrations achieved an extraordinary 98.29%, which promises healthier maternal and newborn outcomes.

Nutrition programs under the campaign included regular monitoring and supplementary feeding that significantly curbed child malnutrition rates. Importantly, our innovative Brain Health Initiative was launched to raise awareness about neurological disorders and ensure early detection and referral pathways, addressing a niche but essential healthcare gap in the block.

The education sector witnessed remarkable progress with near-universal enrollment of children above five years of age. Special initiatives ensured that children with special needs received appropriate learning aids and opportunities. Infrastructure in schools was improved, focusing especially on sanitation facilities with separate, hygienic toilets for girls to promote a safe learning environment. Further, the BharatNet project provided live internet connectivity across all Panchayats, facilitating access to e-learning resources and digital services.

Sanitation infrastructure was strengthened further with all villages of the block declared Open Defecation Free, affirming our commitment to public health and dignity. Under the Jal Jeevan Mission, efforts to provide safe and adequate drinking water reached critical milestones, supported by watershed management and rainwater harvesting structures that enhance groundwater recharge and water security.

In agriculture and allied domains, saturation of soil health cards empowered farmers with essential soil data to optimize cropping patterns. Livestock vaccination drives and fodder development substantially improved animal health and productivity. Watershed development combined with organic manure production units improved sustainable farming practices, contributing to farmers' improved income levels. The dairy sector simultaneously benefitted from cooperative strengthening and subsidy programs.

Financial and social inclusion programs form a vital pillar of our progress. Over 1,200 new bank accounts were opened for women's Neighborhood Groups, facilitating access to credit and financial resources. The Assistive Devices Distribution Programme provided durable aids and appliances to more than 180 individuals with disabilities, enhancing their independence. Our Akshaya Big Campaign focused on document digitization for tribal communities, ensuring universal access to identification and entitlement documents, which are fundamental for participation in welfare schemes and financial services. The program facilitates the issuance of six critical documents namely: Aadhar, Voter ID, Bank Account, Birth Certificate, Ration Card and Health Insurance.

Our program’s success is supported by an allocation of Rs. 3.5 crores from NITI Aayog for scaling and sustaining these initiatives. Funds are judiciously distributed among healthcare infrastructure—including tuberculosis diagnostic centers and digital health equipment—education infrastructure enhancement, agricultural inputs, and water conservation projects.

Looking forward, the road ahead is defined by a few critical priorities. The tuberculosis micro plan will be aggressively implemented in every Panchayat with intensified screening, treatment adherence monitoring, and community engagement to achieve tuberculosis free status. The continuation and expansion of non-communicable disease screening camps will safeguard community health. Completion of document digitization in all Panchayats, coupled with the ongoing monitoring of nutrition and welfare schemes, will ensure coverage and impact. The district administration will maintain its oversight on Panchayat planning and implementation, aligning local priorities with district and state development frameworks.

In conclusion, the transformation witnessed in Parappa Block exemplifies how integrated governance combined with participative planning and community empowerment can achieve inclusive and sustainable development. Our collective efforts have started a virtuous cycle of progress, setting a benchmark for other blocks and districts. I take this opportunity to thank all government functionaries, Panchayat representatives, frontline workers, and above all, the people of Parappa for their inspired cooperation and commitment.



### Kasaragod dist launches 'Brain Health Initiative'

THE Kasaragod district administration has launched 'Brain Health Initiative', a project aimed at improving early detection, diagnosis, and management of neurological disorders, and strengthening healthcare system at all levels in the district. NITI Aayog, District Administration and District Medical Office are jointly implementing the project, as per the special interest of dis-

trict collector Inbasekar K. The project will be guided by Kasaragod district medical officer Ramdas A V.

Santhosh Kappacheri, the nodal officer of the project, said the initiative is focused on brain health, an area that often receives limited attention. The project aims to raise public awareness about brain strokes and related health issues, emphasising the importance of understanding and addressing

brain health in the community.

The project is set to be implemented in three phases. In the first phase, medical professionals and healthcare workers will receive specialised training. The second phase involves collaboration with key stakeholders, including leaders from local self-government departments, to ensure early mobilisation efforts. In the third phase, the general public will

be educated on how to support and care for individuals who have suffered a brain stroke.

As part of the project, a neurological disability survey will be conducted, and healthcare workers will be trained through a structured training and capacity-building programme. This apart, brain health clinics will be established at taluk and district hospital levels, and community awareness programmes will be implemented to reduce stigma and promote early care-seeking.



## Palazhi Project

This project had involve:

- Selection of 2000 cow for insemination with sex sorted semen after synchronization.
- Collecting various samples from the dairy population, including:
  - Blood samples-serum evaluation to find the mineral status (Area specific Mineral Mixture production)
  - Milk samples- to find the somatic cell range to evaluate the quality of milk
  - Blood smear- to evaluate the Blood parasitic load
  - Dung sample-to evaluate the parasitic load
- Using a pre-formulated questionnaire to assess:
  - Educational status of farmers
  - Social well-being of farmers
  - Other relevant socio-economic factors



## TB Nutrition kit distribution

- Nutrition kits were distributed to TB patients in Parappa block to support better treatment outcomes.





NITI Aayog has awarded Parappa Block a total of ₹3.5 crore in recognition of its exceptional performance in implementing the Aspiration Block Programme. This includes ₹1.5 crore for being adjudged the best Aspiration Block in South India in December 2023 and an additional ₹2 crore for securing the second position nationwide this year. This information was conveyed to Kerala Chief Secretary Sharada Muraliedharan by B V R Subrahmanyam, Chief Executive Officer of NITI Aayog. The District Collector has been instructed to submit proposals for various projects to be implemented in the Parappa Aspiration Block.

Inbasekar K, District Collector, said, "The success of Parappa Block can be largely attributed to a two-pronged approach: Firstly, the implementation of regular monthly review meetings with Block Panchayat Presidents and Grama Panchayat Presidents and officials to enhance interdepartmental coordination, preparation and implementation of micro plans for each indicator; and secondly, the consistent provision of oversight to both block and district-level officials, ensuring that the programme's implementation remained on track and effectively achieved its desired outcomes. Among 39 indicators, 12 indicators have been fully achieved, 12 have completed more than 90%, and the remaining 15 are currently under process."

Parappa Block has been ranked second at the national level in the Aspirational Block Programme September 2024 (Quarter) ranking announced by NITI Aayog. As part of the comprehensive Aspirational Block Programme (ABP), the district administration, block panchayats, and relevant departments are actively implementing a diverse range of initiatives aimed at fostering sustainable development within the block. A key component of this programme is the TB Mukta Bharat action plan, which prioritises the eradication of tuberculosis within all panchayats within the block's jurisdiction. The block had secured first place in the South Zone in the December 2023 ranking, third place at the national level, and first place in Kerala in the June 2024 quarter.

Officials from Parappa Block, grama panchayats, and employees from various departments, including Health, Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), Education, Agriculture, Kudumbashree, Local Self-Government, Animal Husbandry, Water Authority, Ground Water, Banking, Suchitwa Mission, NREGA, and Poverty Alleviation, played a crucial role in successfully achieving the Aspirational Block Program's objectives through effective planning and implementation. It had also shown excellent performance as a model state in the flagship Parappa Block. 

